

Epistle Reading: Romans 3:19-28 (ESV)

Now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God. For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin.

But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the Law and the Prophets bear witness to it—the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith. This was to show God's righteousness, because in his divine forbearance he had passed over former sins. It was to show his righteousness at the present time, so that he might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus.

Then what becomes of our boasting? It is excluded. By what kind of law? By a law of works? No, but by the law of faith. For we hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law.

CHILE PARTNERSHIP

The Iglesia Luterana Confesional de Chile (ILC-Chile) is a confessional Lutheran church body. ILC-Chile was created in 1954 as a mission, became a legal entity in 1992, yet is not self-sufficient. The church has communities in Santiago, Valparaíso, Viña del Mar, Talca and Constitución.

The North Dakota District supports the mission congregations in the Maule Region. These churches are located in Talca and Constitucion. Pastor Omar Kinan holds weekly services at Lamb of God in Talca. Once a month he travels to Concepcion, the newest mission congregation in Chile. The Resurrection in Constitucion is served weekly by Pastor Adrian Ventura. Students from the North Dakota District painted this beautiful mural on a wall leading to the entrance of the church!



The ILC-Chile responds to the mandate to make disciples in the country. This objective was established by Jesus Christ when he said: "Make disciples, baptizing them in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to keep all the things that I have commanded you."

Please prayerfully consider if you are being called to donate funds to this worthy mission of the ND District. At our last convention in 2018, our District voted to support Chile in prayer and financial support of \$25,000/year for a total of \$75,000 for the triennium.
